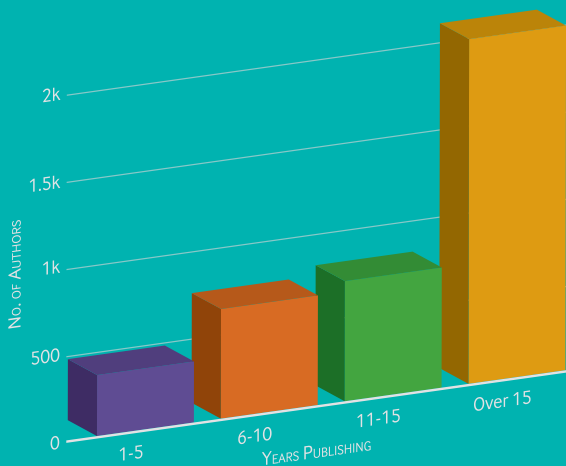
Your authors published this open access content in our Gold and hybrid journals from 2018:

(These figures include all the article authors, not just the Bibsam corresponding author.)

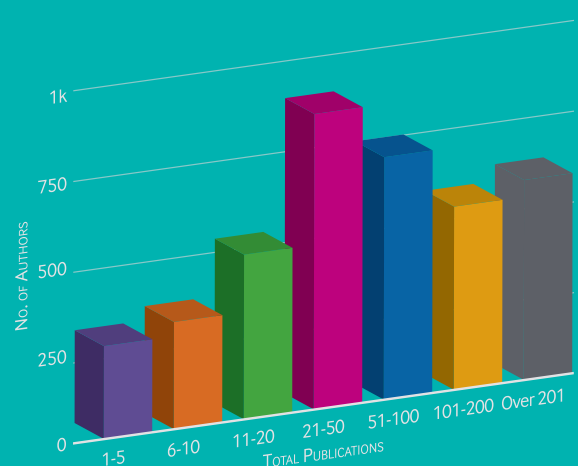
73.5% of your authors have been publishing their research in our journals, and others, for 11 years or more.

71.5% of your authors have published over 21 articles in their publishing career. 15.5% have published over 200 articles.

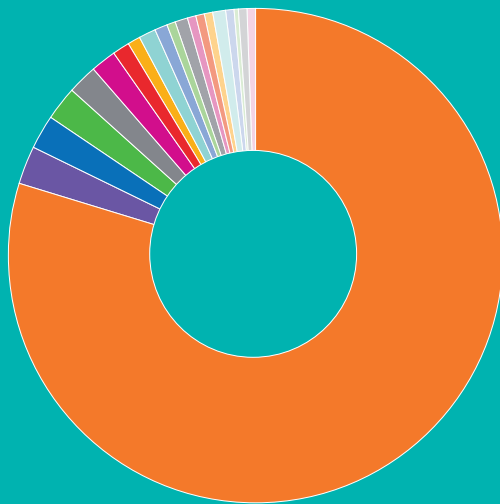
How many articles have these authors published overall?

Across all articles the median number of citations is 5, compared to 3 in non BMJ journals.

Real-world impact on health policy and clinical guidance*

- 10% of Bibsam articles published with BMJ in this period have been cited in clinical guidance or health policy documents, with 255 citations in total.
- Citing sources include WHO; City of Stockholm; Publications office of the EU; NICE; PubMedCentral; and Swedish Agency for Health Technology Assessment & Assessment of Social Services.
- In health policy documents, our 190 recorded citations outperform the cohort date by 104.7%.
